The Dussehra celebrations this year will feature a **Veerabadhra** folk performance, a ritualistic art form from Karnataka. Centered on Veerabadhra, a fierce incarnation of Lord Shiva, this performance is traditionally held during temple festivals and religious ceremonies. The dancers don colorful costumes and bold face paint and



wield swords and tridents, symbolizing the deity's strength. Accompanied by the *dolu* and *damarukam*, the performers energetically depict the story of Veerabadhra's creation by Shiva to avenge the insult to his consort, Sati. The performance is also believed to invoke divine protection and blessings for the community. The event will also showcase the Kinnal craft from Koppal, Karnataka.

OCT. 23: KODAVA HOUSE & EXHIBITION INAUGURATION



Our long search for an Ainmane from Coorg bore fruit finally in 2022. We acquired and dismantled this lovely old house from 1852. It belonged to the Kodira family of Kadanga Village, Virajpet, Coorg district and was trans-

ported to DakshinaChitra in early 2023.

The reconstruction began in June 2023 and is now complete. The house looks imposing and magnificent in the Karnataka section in DakshinaChitra. The exhibition in this house, **The Bold and Beautiful Kodavas**, will tell the story of



the Kodavas, their customs and rich and unique history.

The house and the exhibition in the house is fully funded and supported by the **CSR Wing of Hyundai Motors** - **Mobis India Foundation**. We thank the Managing Director and his CSR team in enabling the wonderful addition of this heritage house to the DakshinaChitra Museum and for their keen interest and invaluable support to preserving and promoting South Indian Culture.

We are excited to **inaugurate the house and exhibition on October 23rd, 2024**, at 11:30a.m. in the presence of the Hyundai Team and Mobis India Foundation, and many representatives from the Kodava community from Coorg and Chennai.

CONSERVATOR'S CORNER

The Conservator's Corner features notes from our in-house conservator on how to restore artefacts. It also includes tips to preserve artefacts at home.

CONDITION REPORT

The object is a terracotta Golu doll of Lord Ganesha with his consorts and two attendants standing. The doll's paint is chipped off in various areas and the colours have faded over time.

The object was first cleaned with ethanol. Next, the portions where the paint was chipped off were filled with white putty and flattened with sandpaper. The idol was then retouched with acrylic paints.

MOPLAH HOUSE GOES GREEN



The Moplah House now has its own open well and a traditional bathing room in the rear side from where one can draw water from the open well directly into the bathroom. A rainwater harvesting system has been installed outside the

house which collects and filters all the rainwater and recharges the sump which irrigates the kitchen garden and the water table too.

A Grey Water Recycling System has been installed in the bathroom. More systems have been installed here including a Food Waste Composting Unit and a Leaf Litter Composting Unit. Several other units will be added soon.

DEC. 16: CHRISTMAS CELEBRATIONS

At DakshinaChitra, we put an eco-friendly spin on the conventional Secret Santa game as we play 'Green Secret Santa', an event where visitors are encouraged to bring and exchange plants



as gifts. There will also be a performance of popular Christmas carols by a choir from Madras Christian College in the evening.

DEC. 25 - 29 : KERALA VILLAGE FESTIVAL



The festival will feature Muchilott Bhagavathy Theyyam, a revered native ritualistic dance form. It is a vivid manifestation of the Goddess Muchilott Bhagavathy, showcased through elaborate costumes, dramatic makeup, and vibrant dance. Performed in sacred groves, temples, and homes, the dance is accompanied by traditional percussion instruments like the chenda and

elathalam. The ritual represents a profound act of devotion, blurring the lines between the divine and the ephemeral. Attendees will experience an immersive expression of faith and communal identity, reflecting the deep-rooted spiritual and cultural traditions of Kerala.

OBJECT OF THE MONTH

Udukkai (or Dudi) (image on the right) is an hourglass-shaped instrument with ancient roots. The body of the Dudi is approximately 15cms long, with a diameter of 16cms on either side. The instrument is made from a single block of hollowed-out wood. The Vellum (thin layer of animal skin) is stretched across the flat drum heads, slightly curved at the ends. A



little string loosely links two sides of the body through a wooden hoop. The sounds of Dudi on both sides can be differentiated as "male and female" sounds. Bolak-Aat, the Kodava traditional dance, is performed by Kodava males in front of an oil lamp in an open field to mark celebrations. The Dudi provides the rhythm for the dance. The Dudi is extensively used during Kodava weddings, festivals and even funerals. Check it out during your next visit to the museum!

BOOK OF THE MONTH

The DakshinaChitra Library has a rich collection of books on various subjects including art, craft, textiles, anthropology, theatre, architecture, history and more. We invite you to come view this vast repository of books during your visit. We will also be highlighting a book recommendation to keep you clued in on the 'Must-read' titles in our collection.



The book, *In God's Mirror - The Theyyams of Malabar*, by Pepita Seth is a testament to Seth's journey of uncovering the hidden layers of the 2000-year-old ritualistic practice of Theyyam. Unique to the Malabar region, Theyyam is an ancient form of worship where men don elaborate costumes

and intricate make-up that, during possession, embody particular deities. Theyyam is said to be a corruption of the word 'daivam' which simply means God, remarks Seth. "While the process is an internal one that obliterates the practitioner's human persona, on an external level his face is transformed by intricate make-up and his body fantastically costumed," she says. The book takes the reader through an in-depth explanation of the landscape of this practice - from the deities, shrines or places of worship, practitioners, training, cultural stories to the various communities associated with the same. It is also filled with artistic photographs taken by the author that portray the mystical nature of the region, taking the viewer on a visual journey. We are thankful to Gita Rao for donating this book to our Library.

LOOKING BACK : FOLKLORE ROUND TABLE

The Folklore Round Table on the "Challenges in Folklore Research in Tamil Nadu" was held on September 10. It was inaugurated by Vijaya Thayanban, Secretary of Tamil Nadu Eyal Isai Nataka Manram. The event highlighted the evolution of folklore in response to social and political changes in the 20th and 21st century. It stressed the importance of viewing folklore as adaptive and reflective of both historical and contemporary practices while recognizing the limitations of singular interpretations. With 10 experts and 50 participants, the event served as a foundation for developing how cultural institutions like DakshinaChitra, alongside government policies and academic institutions, can address these challenges and strengthen research and education in this sector.
